1, 2 and 3. There are no factories and no licensed wholesalers in Gibraltar.

4(a). Permits or authorisations for the use or possession of these drugs have been issued only to the Colonial Hospital and to registered chemists. There are no licensed wholesalers or pharmaceutical firms manufacturing preparations for the wholesale trade.

4(b). The quantities imported were so small that no illicit traffic in them can have taken place.

The methods of inspection and powers of inspectors are stated in the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, and were set out in the Return for 1935.
